Style is sufficiently formal and academic. Appropriate professional vocabulary used. 	 The paper is appropriately structured and comprises the following: Cover page Table of Contents Introduction Literature Review Research Design Optional: Piloting research tools/ Data collection and analysis Conclusion Appendices containing supplementary materials Figures, which are supplied with a title and are numbered The paper is clearly divided into chapters with headings, which are numbered. All pages are numbered except the cover page. 	 The writer should explain their reason for choosing the topic, research questions (and hypothesis) to be investigated are presented. The literature relevant to the topic is reviewed and presented with a focus on the topic of the paper. Key concepts are defined for the research. A sufficient number of sources are consulted: min. 10 quality sources referenced A research project has been planned, described (research questions and hypotheses, research methods and part of the tools presented and justified). Optional: piloting one of the data collection tools. The technique of triangulation is applied in the research plan: the area under investigation is looked at using two or more research methods/sample groups or investigators.

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	 Optional: pilot data is presented in a systematic way, charts/graphs are used appropriately.
